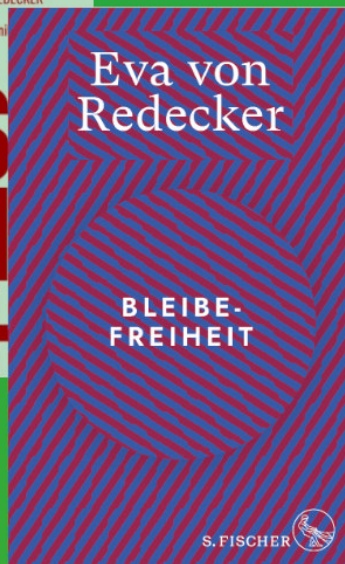

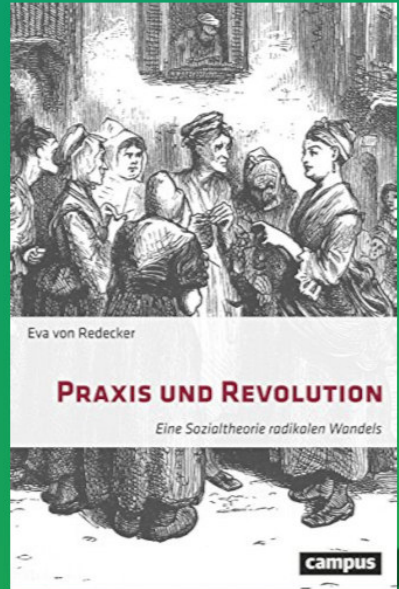
After spending her childhood on her parents' organic farm in Schleswig-Holstein, she studied German literature, history and philosophy in Kiel, Tübingen, Cambridge and Potsdam.

Her master's thesis dealt with the moral philosophy of Hannah Arendt
(Part 14 of this series).



At the beginning of her career, as a research associate in social philosophy at *Humboldt University* in Berlin, she engaged with issues of property, subjectivity and Critical Theory, and began to take part publicly in debates about society and politics.





Above all, her books "Praxis und Revolution" and "Revolution für das Leben" increased her public profile. In them, she presents a theory of life-serving societies that must take care work, feminism, the ecological crisis and capitalism into account. She develops concepts of how care, interconnectedness and sustainability can be used as ways to counter the life- and nature-destroying capitalist conditions.





She regularly comments on issues such as climate and environmental protection, queer rights, feminism, social change, and property relations.

Among other things, she was active in the *Zero Covid* campaign and, together with several thousand university lecturers, spoke out against the sanctions against members of higher education institutions called for in 2004 by Minister of Education and Research Bettina Stark-Watzinger.
